## **Collaborative Time Committee**

- 12 staff representing every discipline
- 5 meetings
- Contacted 41 schools to inquire how much collaborative time they have and when
- 37/41 have early release days and a 4/41 have late starts; most said they need more collaborative time
- Created 3 proposals #1 early release, #2 late start and #3 early dismissal to meet from 7<sup>th</sup> period to 3:30 p.m.
- 99% of MHS staff prefer proposal #1 early release
- Proposal #1 provides the most time

### **COLLABORATIVE TIME PROPOSAL #1**

#### **EARLY RELEASE**

- Students released at 11:16 a.m.
- Teachers will meet 11:45 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. (3 hours)
- Number of early release days: 7
  - Jan, Feb, Mar, April, May
- Total collaborative hours: 21 hours/year
- The time will come from the restructuring of Advisory Period

## **COLLABORATIVE TIME PROPOSAL #2**

#### **LATE START**

- Students arrive at 9:45 a.m.
- Teachers will meet 7:45-9:15 a.m. (1 hour 30 min)
- Number of late start days: 9
  Oct, Dec, Jan, Feb, Mar, April, May, June
- Total collaborative hours: 13.5 hours/year
- The time will come from the restructuring of Advisory Period

### WHAT IS AN "ADVISORY PERIOD?

NEASC requires that each school has a formal, on-going <u>Advisory</u> <u>Program</u> through which each student has an adult in the school, in addition to the school guidance counselor, who knows the student well and assists the student in achieving the school's learning expectations.

## **ADVISORY PERIOD**

In Spring 2012, an Advisory Ad-Hoc Committee was formed to review our current advisory program and to collect data from local high schools regarding their advisory programs.

#### What did they determine?

- Faculty advisors should meet individually with each of their students once per term.
- On average, faculty advisors need 4-5 sessions per term to meet individually with each of their students.
- These meetings are approximately 5-7 minutes per student.

# RESTRUCTURING OF THE ADVISORY PERIOD

#### In 2012-2013:

- Letter sent home to parents explaining.
- There will be <u>21 Advisory Periods</u> which will allow faculty advisors to meet with each of their students 4 times per year.
- Group Guidance will continue to meet during this time.
- The extra time gained back from the repackaging will provide more instructional time as well as collaborative time for the faculty and staff.

#### WHAT IS GROUP GUIDANCE?

Group Guidance is a developmental counseling program that helps students to:

- Achieve optimal growth
- Acquire positive skills and values
- Set appropriate career goals
- Realize their full academic potential.

#### WHAT HAPPENS IN GROUP GUIDANCE?

- Students will access their NAVIANCE accounts and take the Learning Style Inventory
- Students will take the Career Interest Inventory
- Juniors will discuss SAT/ACT registration and college testing
- Seniors (and parents) will meet individually to confirm Naviance/College Board/FERPA.
- Seniors will meet about college application process
- Counselors and students will discuss school activities, clubs, advisors, the chain of command including administration and department heads, homework policies, truancy, unexcused tardiness, and the community service requirement, etc.

#### INCREASING STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT

By reallocating some of the time we used for Advisory Period, we will provide more instructional time for students and create collaborative time for teachers
