Re: E-Update, Friday, February 12, 2010

As educators, we spend the largest portion of our time focused on teaching, learning, assessment and curriculum issues. Recently, I received a report from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, which details the link between recess and academic achievement. This first-of-its-kind Gallup Poll surveyed more than 2,000 principals nationwide and revealed that recess provides a significant opportunity to boost learning. The study concluded that play is essential to the physical, social and emotional development of students. Other highlights of the report include:

- Four out of five principals report that recess has a positive impact on academic achievement.
- Two-thirds of principals report that students listen better after recess and are more focused in class.
- Virtually all believe that recess has a positive impact on children's social development (96 percent) and general well-being (97 percent).
- Children who have more recess time behave better in the classroom and are more likely to learn.

"This research sends a clear message to anyone interested in improving education or the overall well-being of America's children: it's time to take recess seriously," said Jane Lowe, a director at the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. "Recess should no longer be treated as an afterthought but as a core part of any strategy for promoting learning and improving health."

In Milton, as in many other communities nationwide, the time allocated for recess and physical education classes has been steadily eroding. A 2005 study found that the average American student participates in only 22 minutes of recess a day. And according to the Gallup poll, one in five principals has reported cutting recess minutes to meet testing requirements.

In addition to academic improvement, students can also enjoy health benefits from recess and physical education. First Lady Michelle Obama recently spoke about how parents and schools can work together to provide more opportunities for physical activity during the day.

We will be reviewing this research study with our administrative team and the school committee over the next several weeks to see what improvements can be made to our recess policies. – Mary C. Gormley

School Committee Update

The most recent School Committee meeting was held on Tuesday, February 9th. Here is a summary from that meeting:

The Milton Foundation for Education presented information about how the recent teacher grants are being used at the Pierce Middle School. MFE representative Leslie Collins joined Pierce Assistant Principal Dr. Karen Spaulding, Science teachers Jennifer Gilbert and Kathleen Bertrand to discuss the purchase of lighting and watering systems, along with planting supplies. The new equipment will allow students to study genetics, plant biology, and natural selection using Wisconsin Fast Plants which have a 40 day life cycle.

Next, Milton Public Schools' Information Technology Director Bob Pattison reported on the school's technology plan. Because of cost-cutting measures, the Milton Public Schools have a lower per-pupil spending rate on technology than is recommended by the State Department of Education.

Mr. Pattison also reported on streamlining methods he has instituted, which have saved both time and money. In particular, he described a new system for the MHS Guidance Department which has been very helpful.

Both the administration and the School Committee have been working on the FY addition to the prospect of a level-funded budget for FY11, the town's Warrant Committee notified the schools to expect a reduction this year of \$151,000 as a result of proposed cuts in state aid. The level-funded budget would mean the loss of 24.4 positions and the most recent reduction could mean the loss of three *additional* positions within the schools, for a total of 27.4 FTE (full time equivalent) positions. We strongly feel that this type of reduction will impact student instruction and achievement. We also discussed a new enrichment program which will begin in March at the Pierce Middle School. We are proud to offer the first Milton Public Schools Saturday Enrichment Program for students in grades four through seven. This year's pilot program will run March 6th, 13th, 20th and 27th from 8am to 11:45am at the Pierce Middle School.

Students will attend three one-hour sessions and participate in a fun activity period. The cost for the four-week Saturday Program will be \$100 per student. The course offerings and registration instructions have been mailed out and have been posted online at www.miltonps.org under the "News" heading. This very exciting program has been made possible by the generous funds generated by the Milton Foundation for Education's Celebration 2009.
