VISUAL LITERACY THROUGH FILM (Unleveled) 935

Visual Literacy through Film is a non-studio semester course with no pre-requisite, offered to those students with an interest in the exploration of the artistic characteristics of film and film-making. Primarily intended for students not intent upon concentrating on "art-making," course requirements include reflective essays, class discussions, research, art criticism and contemporary approaches to the ascetics of film as an art medium.

Course Objectives

Student will be able to:

- 1. Identify the different styles within filmmaking.
- 2. Analyze a variety of visual elements that help create emotional, and psychological emphasis in film.
- 3. Understand how film is physically constructed
- 4. Analyze the symbolic purposes for camera movement, character movement and mechanical distortion.
- 5. Create a stop-motion video.
- 6. Implement their knowledge of visual elements to create emotional, and psychological emphasis
- 7. Compare and contrast images within an edited scene
- 8. Understand the history of editing and the styles it falls into.
- 9. Discuss and utilize how sound is incorporated into film, and its history.
- 10. Utilize their knowledge of emotional emphasis in sound to create their own alternative soundtrack
- 11. Analyze the importance of costume and set design to film.
- 12. Identify different acting styles.
- 13. Recognize different narrative structures and the use of symbols and metaphors in film.
- 14. Combine the knowledge of all every covered topic in analyzing a single film.
- 15. Be aware of emotional, psychological, physiological, and cognitive influences in perceptions of visuals
