- Exciting to see the progress of the students, reflect the hard work and dedication of your staff here in Milton

Betty White

• Children on IEPs that were being removed in or out of school, how many on the IEP's had social/emotional or mental health issue that might be a factor of why that was happening

Ms. Maselli

- When the removal is related to the disability, the Special Education Team gets together to talk about it, a lot of the removals are related to drug use, we do not have weapons used but that would fall into this category, and fighting these situations would require a bigger response
- When a removal is related to an argument, that is when you would see an in school response, don't want kids to be away from instruction

- The drug related comment Ms. Maselli made is usually related with the vaping marijuana
- Take very seriously if a child is under the influence
- Parents/guardians would be called

Ms. Rosmarin

- Thanked Ms. Maselli and staff for the results that we are seeing and how well our Special Education students are doing
- Thankful for you and your team from bringing our Special Ed students back during the pandemic
- Special Education students were the first students back
- Asked about Out of District placement, with the possibility of building a new school we
 have talked about additional space for Out of District students to come back to Milton for
 services
- Is there a certain category of need that we would need to address if we had this space

Ms. Maselli

- There are three areas that we will need to continue to talk about program development
 - Building more universal preschool for the district
 - Diversion Program for our high school students support students in recovery, and a level of mental health needs
 - Neurological combined with language based needs

Dr. Carroll

- Appreciate being able to see the decline in referrals
- Impressed by the details, looking forward to seeing the data unfold
- Asked Ms. Maselli if she could underscore what was said about Equitable Proportional shared (slide 18) as far as the Federal Funding that supports the students the funding is only available to families for that purpose
- Can you clarify?

Ms. Maselli

- Every district in Massachusetts has an IDEA grant which is a federal grant
- Are required to use a proportion of the grant for students who go to a parent choice school or a private school within our community
- Supporting 5 schools now, Milton and non residents attending those schools are provided services using the grant if they are on an IEP
- Not as robust as their IEP, it is determined a very comprehensive needs assessment for all the schools
- Includes components of their IEP, it gives the families an opportunity to receive services while they attend a Catholic School or school or their choice

- If a Milton family attends a private school in Boston or Randolph, they would have the same opportunity, it is equitable across every town
- It is federal money, it is not flexible on how is it used

Dr. Carroll

• Can you confirm for the community, where Milton is in relations to other districts when it comes to increase in referrals

Ms. Maselli

- Many districts are seeing an increase
- During the pandemic schools were closed
- Lag in evaluations, were able to catch up last summer
- Every town in the Commonwealth has struggled and seeing an increase in Special Education
- Seeing increasing in the Early Childhood program

Chair Eberhardt

- In the presentation you mentioned the increase in awareness on behalf of educators, shows through the dedication of your staff
- Special Education is a complex highly regulated part of education
- Really appreciate your presentation and for communicating with the community

- Inclusion is an increase goal for Collicot, we are lucky to have three programs within the school
 - o Direct partner with New England Center for Children
 - Two Classrooms that are Milton Teachers that focus on a very specific population
- Because we have these personalized learning platforms in order to access to the content on these platforms it is necessary to take a diagnostic assessment
- For some students their IEP does not dictate working on grade level standards in an inclusion classroom every day
- When families reach out and ask about what is a great program to use, we know the district has spent a lot of money on Lexia and Iready, we want the students to have that
- Can break down the diagnostic assessment over time for the students
- Students who were behind were invited to Behind the Bell program during school vacation
- Want all students to be offered the same programs as their peers

Principal Concannon

- Proud of the inclusion program
- More students are included in the MCAS in the program
- Increase of inclusion is more of a celebration

Ms. White

- Thank you for the wonderful and thorough presentation
- Really gives a feel of what your school is like
- Looking at the data, it encouraging to see the students grow in all the different grades
- The foundation on which you focus your school on, social/emotional learning, slides on kindness and the classroom lessons

• Curious what Principal Concannon and Principal Fish's perspective was on the transition for the 5&6 grade model

Principal Fish

- We have a problem with our overcrowding
- There is no perfect solution
- Time we have is an asset to us
- Need to make the best decision for our families
- There are a handful of schools in the commonwealth that have made this transition that we can learn from
- Primary challenge is the overcrowding, this proposal helps alleviate that

Principal Concannon

- Hurt to think about losing the 5th grade, it is a very special year in the school
- Now after having time to think about it, now the idea of 5th and 6th graders together would be helpful with their transition to learn together
- Should use our 5th&6th teachers to design the model to help support the students
- Offering the students a diverse experience starting in 5th grade

Ms. White

- More than the kids the parents were anxious about middle school
- 5-6 together is less intimidating
- In many ways it may be an easier transition

Ms. Ross Denny

- Was one of those nervous parents concerned about middle school
- Is our assumption that the 5th grade setting will be similar to what is in now or will they go class to class

Principal Concannon

- Still need to figure it out, wouldn't able to respond right now about the schedules
- Will need to rely on the curriculums coordinators

Superintendent Jette

- Certification of specific content
- 7-8 being close to the High School campus, we have waiver for athletics
- Pre-K program at the high school
- Expose more high school students to the Pre-K program
- Transition of the middle school camp
- 6th graders now can be so anxious
- Diversifying the schools at an earlier grade
- Families will benefit from the new facility
- Details still need to be worked out, we have time

Assistant Superintendent Sheehan

- Initial proposal was a concern, think the way it has been presented with the research and the pro/cons really limits the concerns now of the transitions
- Agree there are some implications around the certifications, we have time to update and address
- Presentation was very clear and helpful to understand the implications of this configuration

Sean O'Rourke

- Work we have done over the past three years has been a lot
- We have to get this project right

Dr. Carroll

- Response to the presentation, really doesn't make sense to go through process and still have the overcrowding at the middle school
- Understand it has been a journey and why it started as another elementary school
- Glad you were able to think outside the box
- Everything about this new proposal makes sense
- Understand this may difficult for some parents who will have students in three different buildings
- Have time to be thoughtful with schedules, how it can all be maximized with efficiency for families
- Supporting the motion on the table

- Lesson from the pandemic helped for us to think outside the box
- While we are thinking about the overcrowding and space needs, it affords us to rethink about our instruction method
- Really providing us opportunities to be innovative and creative

a. Second Reading, Policy IC, School Year/School Year Calendar

SCHOOL YEAR/SCHOOL CALENDAR

The school calendar for the ensuing year will be prepared by the Superintendent after sharing and discussion with the Milton Educators Teachers' Association and then submitted to the School Committee for approval by May 1st of each year.

The number of days or instructional hours scheduled for the school year will be determined in accordance with the following standards set by the Massachusetts Board of Education:

- 1. Elementary school will operate for a minimum of 180 days. Each elementary and middle school student will be scheduled to receive a minimum of 900 hours per school year of structured learning time, as defined in 603 CMR 27.02. Time which a student spends at school breakfast and lunch, passing between classes, in homeroom, at recess, in non-directed study periods, receiving school services, and participating in optional school programs shall not count toward meeting the minimum structured learning time requirement for that student.
- 2. Secondary schools will operate for a minimum of 180 days. Every secondary school student will be scheduled to receive a minimum of 990 hours per school year of structured learning time, as defined in 603 CMR 27.02. Time which a student spends at school breakfast and lunch, passing between classes, in homeroom, at recess, in non-directed study periods, receiving school services, and participating in optional school programs shall not count toward meeting the minimum structured learning time requirement for that student.

State and federal laws require schools to make reasonable accommodation to the religious needs of students and employees in observance of holy days. Mass. General Laws Chapter 151B, section 4 (1A) addresses this issue with respect to employees. With respect to students, Mass. General Laws Chapter 151C, section 2B reads in relevant part as follows:

1. Any student in an educational or vocational training institution...who is unable, because of his religious beliefs, to attend classes or to participate in any examination, study or work requirement on a particular day shall be excused from any such examination or study or work requirement, and shall be provided with an opportunity to make up such examination, study or work requirement which he may have missed because of such absence on any particular day; provided, however, that such makeup examination or work shall not create an unreasonable burden upon such school. No fees of any kind shall be charged by the institution for making available to the said student such opportunity. No adverse or prejudicial effects shall result to any student because of his availing himself of the provisions of this section.

<u>In the case of religious holidays that are not recognized with a holiday (day off) in Milton Public Schools:</u>

- 1. Whenever possible, Milton Public Schools will avoid scheduling district- or school-wide meetings (eg. Kindergarten Information Night) in conflict with a religious holiday, even if it is not a school holiday.
- 2. Parents/guardians are asked to notify teachers, in advance, when a student is planning to be absent in order to observe a religious holiday. In addition to absence from school, any absence from extracurricular activities, due to the observance of a religious holiday, will be considered as an excused absence.
- 3. Whenever possible, reasonable accommodations to the religious needs of students and employees in observance of holy days shall be made (eg. in the case of someone who is fasting for Ramadan).

For the information of staff, students, parents <u>and guardians</u>, the calendar will set forth the days schools will be in session; holidays and vacation periods; professional development <u>days</u>; and parent conferences.

Ms. White asked Assistant Superintendent Dexter to speak about the correction that was made at the Warrant Subcommittee meeting.

Assistant Superintendent Dexter

- Didn't have the opportunity to answer all the questions on the list because they were not financially related
- They questioned the Superintendent salary increase from what was budgeting FY22
 - When Superintendent Jette was interim it was late August, contract was equivalent to 10 months
 - When the budget was put together in the fall, it was budgeting for 10 months and not the annualized 12 month salary amount
 - When compared, it looked like a large increase, but that is not the case
 - The contract is 2.5% not 25%

- Strategic Plan in place for three years
- Goals have been guided by the Strategic Plan
- Will be bringing a revised plan to the next School Committee meeting

• The new plan will be more focused and concise

9. Curriculum and Instruction Advisory Committee Report - Ms. Ross Denny

- A lot of the content has been discussed
- This meeting was February 17th and questioned were asked:

- Judaism in our curriculum
 - Is present in the elementary curriculum
 - Culture holidays
 - Appears in the middle school
 - Don't have a topic on organized religion
 - Will meet again next Thursday, can revisit and plan to update the curriculum
- Overview of the Math Curriculum
 - Brain Selig and Dr. Carroll covered what was shared in the meeting
 - More in depth conversations
 - Process of active evaluating a new Math Curriculum
- o Restorative Justice work
 - Where is it going, where did it come from
 - Initiated to identify the African Americans Black students at risk for disproportionality for school disciplinary removals
 - Same sub group flagged in disproportionality in Special Education
 - Sue Maselli has been able to identify Federal aid to address this
 - Goal is to dramatically reduce or eliminate the disproportionality of African American students who are identified for disciplinary removal
 - Pupil Personnel Services created a comprehensive plan using the DESE plan mode for success in response to the discipline work
 - Restorative Justice is one of the strategies that they are using to achieve this goal
 - That would include the Restorative Justice Coach, who has visited all the elementary schools
 - Also funding the Professional Development for Restorative Justice for all MPS Administrators
 - Establish relationships amongst the faculty
